Every time the clocks change, there are protests about whether they should change more, or less or in different way. Every time Christmas falls on a day which robs us of a day's shopping, there are calls to "regularise" the date, forgetting perhaps that it is in simplest terms a birthday. Every time Easter is either very early or late, there are questions as to why the schools' terms, summer holidays, indeed the whole nation, should be in thrall to the oddities of Christian calculation.

This year Easter is late - 24th April, almost as late as it can get. The calculation is as convoluted as the reasons are archaic.

In very early Christian times, when the Church was growing out of Judaism, Easter was obvious. It was fixed by the date of the Passover festival, Nisan 15 in the Jewish calendar. But then the Christian faith became part of the Roman Empire, and the date of Easter had to fit in to the new Gregorian calendar. Only the Eastern part of the Roman Empire based on Constantinople, had long followed the Julian calendar.

These calendars are not just a matter of picking a series of dates and moving them about in parallel. They all to a greater or lesser extent, determine dates both by the movement of the sun and the moon. On top of that, the dates have drifted over time as more precise ways of calculating the length of a solar year have been discovered.

It is not just Easter that is moved about. Easter is directly connected with the forty days that precede it and the fifty days that follow. The forty days before Easter take us back to Ash Wednesday, this year on 9th March, which in turn shoves pancake day back to 8th March. After Easter, the next forty days take us on to Ascension day, which is why, Easter always being a Sunday, Ascension is always a Thursday. But there is another

calculation. Easter is on a Sunday. If we were to count the following Sunday as being an imaginary Monday, and the Sunday after that as an imaginary Tuesday, and so on, we would be beginning to count the week of weeks. This follows over the seven Sundays after Easter, overtaking the Ascension until we get to the Sunday of the week of weeks. Seven sevens are forty nine, and one more, the last Sunday of the great week, makes up the fifty of the day of Pentecost. This is the fiftieth day after Easter and marks the feast



remembering the gift of the Holy Spirit to the disciples and to the world.

So here is the carrot and the stick. The carrot says that if we go along with the oddness of the date of Easter we will know ourselves to be part of something very old, a bit archaic, but with the potential to be fun in an impromptu sort of a way. The stick says that if we hear again that there is pressure to sort out the silliness of the date of Easter once and for all, I get to do more maths.

Good readers of the BVN, I beg you to spare yourselves this goading, and let me lapse into merciful silence.

Peace; be still.

On why our church does not need health or safety...

My dear Nephew Darren

The disasters you inflict on church life are made the worse because they are so well meaning. I appreciated your concern when you heard one of our parishioners had slipped on a gravestone. Your desire to help was entirely commendable; sending your own church's health and safety officer to give us some advice was kindly-meant. But the thousand page report was not welcome. If we implemented your officer's suggestions, life would become unbearably safe.

St. James the Least has survived perfectly well for the last 600 years without gutter cleaning inspections, path degreasing and electrical safety certificates, so I think we may survive a little longer without them. As far as I am aware, the only disaster to hit us was when Cromwell's soldiers stabled their horses in the nave - which I suspect a few of our oldest members still clearly remember.

The shock the sidesmen sometimes get when switching on the lights occurs only occasionally, is relatively mild and soon over - and if it happens when preparing for the 8am Service, helps to wake them up. The fact that the weight of the Duke of Clumber's marble sarcophagus is slowly detaching the south aisle from the rest of the church is very slow - and the pews in that area are used only once a year when his relations visit from America to commemorate his death at Agincourt - which is probably just beyond remembrance of the oldest of our congregation.

Leaks from the ceiling in the north aisle are solved with the row of buckets - and even you must concede that the fungi on the oak beams look really rather attractive when the sun catches them. The sapling growing out of the spire is certainly an issue - although it looks so attractive in Spring when in blossom. As for our fire extinguishers, they were

serviced when my predecessor-but-two was in office, and I have the certificate to prove it.

Do thank your health and safety officer for all his work and tell him we will bear his recommendations in mind. Also tell him I was so sorry he slipped and broke his leg as he was entering your own church last Sunday. If only he had been encased in bubble wrap, it would never have happened. Perhaps you could put that on the agenda of your next health and safety meeting.

BRIDPORT & DISTRICT U3A

Bridport & District University of the Third Age (U3A) has been awarded a grant of £2,430 by the Big Lottery Fund.



The grant will be used to buy state-of-the-art slide and digital projectors, projector screen, laptop computer and software and a PA system to use at its meetings and study groups. Money has also been allocated to design a web site.

The award is a major boost for U3A which has enrolled more than 250 members from Bridport, Beaminster, Burton Bradstock and surrounding villages since it was relaunched in January this year.

It has become the fastest growing U3A in the South-West with more than 25 study groups ranging from books and bird watching to maths for fun and philosophy. Ten of the groups are full and have waiting lists of people wanting to join.

“The Lottery Fund grant means that we can set out to attract top quality speakers to our meetings because we can guarantee to provide them with the very best audio visual equipment,” said Jan Kelly, chair of the steering committee. “It is a huge bonus for U3A and the people of Bridport & District.”

The U3A will start the New Year in a new home. From January its regular monthly meetings on the fourth Tuesday of the month will take place at the Bridport United Church in East Street.



2011 CENSUS

COMING TO A LETTERBOX NEAR YOU

In March 2011 all residential households in the UK will be taking part in a census. Since 1801 a day has been chosen every ten years for this purpose. The census provides an

excellent source of information about the population. This enables central and local government, health authorities and many other organisations to plan housing, education, health and transport services for years to come.

The census statistics help identify people's needs to help local authorities plan and provide local services, so it is crucial that the population estimate is as accurate as possible. When the questionnaire envelope comes through the door you'll easily recognise it by its purple 2011 Census logo. Take care of it. If, like many people, you choose to complete the questionnaire online you'll need your individual internet code which is on the front of the questionnaire.

The 2011 Census doesn't want anyone to miss out – so there is a wide range of help options available (such as language guidance booklets, large print format, Text Relay and census field staff on hand, as well as online help and telephone help lines).

ROYAL BRITISH LEGION ABBOTSBURY & PORTESHAM BRANCH



It is with sorrow that we have to record the death of one of our eldest members, **GEORGE E. STOKES** (Formerly of Portesham), a few days before Christmas, aged 92 years.

George, commissioned from the ranks, had a distinguished Service career with the Royal Artillery/Royal Army Pay Corps, serving in many locations throughout this country, in Europe (WW2) and North Africa. One of his appointments was to a London battery providing AA cover for the city. He was demobbed in 1946, but he rejoined the R.Artilery with the rank of Captain in 1950, and served for another ten years. On leaving the Army George joined the civil service and worked as a tax inspector.

In Portesham he was for some years the Church Warden at St Peter's and a prominent member of the PCC.

In his early years George was a very good footballer playing as a fullback with Barnet, who were the top amateur team in England at the time. He never lost his love of soccer and would talk about it and watch it whenever he could.

George will be sadly missed and our thoughts and prayers are with his son Richard, and daughter Jill, together with their families, at this time. [His wife Stella passed away two years ago].

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

The New Year has begun and maybe it's time to reflect on the cold period we had. Let's have a think about your 'Home' and 'Key Holder'. The weather can do more damage to your house than any burglar. A minimal checklist below should help protect your biggest investment – your home.

1. Does your key holder know where the main 'stop cock' is? Does the handle move easily to turn the water on/off?
2. Are all pipes lagged properly? Please note that overflow pipes are the first to freeze.
3. Do cisterns, pipes that feed loos, showers, washing machine etc. have an on/off valve? These make a plumber's job easier and cheaper if you do.
4. Keep a bag of salt & grit handy. Spare a thought for the postman and key holder etc.
5. If you are a car owner, check if you need anti-freeze. Do not use hot water to de-ice your windscreen unless you want a new one!
6. Are your neighbours ok? Who will be making sure they are alright for shopping, sweeping their path if snow, etc. if you are away?
7. Have a back-up heating system like a mobile oil filled electric radiator.
8. If you have an oil tank remember to check the fuel gauge before winter starts again!

Some of the above points are common sense; some will cost a bit from a reliable plumber but will be cheap at the price compared to a flooded home.


LITTON CHENEY SOCIAL COMMITTEE
