"Because it's too far to crawl."

DO SOMETHING IMPORTANT NOW REGISTER FOR BROADBAND

Superfast broadband for Dorset would seem to be a year or two away why should we worry about it now?

No contractor has been appointed, so we don't know what we will get or when it will happen. But there is something you can do right NOW! Something which will help all our rural internet users – you, your neighbour and the whole community.



Potential providers, eg BT and Fujitsu, want to know the sort of demand for these better services in each area around every exchange and all villages. Our County Council is running an on-line survey to register the demand for Superfast.

Put simply, the more people who answer this survey, the better the service we will get because the contractor will be aware of the potential demand for the Superfast service. It doesn't cost you to do this - it is a survey to determine your intentions and wishes, **not** a form to sign up to the new service. That will be coming from your present service provider and competition should mean it won't cost any more for a substantial improvement in speed and service.

And even if you are lucky and are getting an adequate service for your needs now, think about those in our community who live in black spots and cannot get proper broadband. If we can persuade the contractors to give us all an upgrade, they will get the greatest benefit. Think too of the future and of your children and grand-children. What you think is good now will not seem so good in a few year's time when those in the towns have got something better and we won't. The contractor will only pass by here once, so register for yourself, your family, for me, for your neighbour and for the Bride Valley. Go on line, fill in the survey and do something really important today - and then go and get your neighbours to do the same.




FROM THE FIELDS

There is growing evidence of the links between a specific disease in livestock and the presence on grazing land of faeces from infected dogs.

Caused by the parasite *neospora caninum*, the disease is now thought to be responsible for the highest percentage of all cattle abortions reported in the UK. Once neosporosis infection has occurred in a cattle herd it can persist within the herd due to transmission of the parasite between cows and calves. However spread of the disease between unrelated females only occurs where a dog acts as host to the parasite – such point sources of transmission can cause 'abortion storms' within a herd. The parasite can be picked up by dogs through the ingestion of contaminated livestock material, such as placentas from newly calved cows, or by being fed contaminated raw meat. Neosporosis – which can cause abortions in cattle was not discovered until



1984 in Norway, where it was found in dogs. Now found worldwide, it is highly transmissible and some herds can have up to a 90% prevalence. Neospora causes abortions in cattle and up to 33% of pregnancies on a single dairy farm can result in aborted calves.







ST JAMES THE LEAST OF ALL

The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tongue-in-cheek letters from 'Uncle Eustace:'

On publishing my book

*The Rectory
St. James the Least*

My dear Nephew Darren

After all these years, who would have believed it: to have my own book printed. I must admit, I had imagined a leather-bound volume with gold leaf lettering on the spine - perhaps even titled "Volume One", implying future delights when further work would appear. A paperback, held together with glue was a slight disappointment. The publisher's reason for a print run of 50, saying that it meant fewer would have to be dumped in cut-price bookshops was not what I had expected either.

He seemed to think that my commentary on Eusebius's

tables for cross-referencing the gospels, as explained in his letter to Carpianus, would not have mass interest. While I concede it will be unlikely to dent the sales of Harry Potter, and that I am unlikely to be involved in negotiating the film rights, I had hoped for slightly more enthusiasm for this stride forward in global knowledge.

The excitement of the book launch and signing was also tempered when only the bishop arrived, expecting a free copy, so he could mark it for theological errors. My suggestion that he take a copy to colour it in did not go down well. I suspect I will not now be asked to deliver a paper on it at the next clergy conference.

I was briefly excited when several parishioners came into the shop. But it turned out that one wanted to book a baptism with me, and another wanted to complain that at his recent wedding, I had nearly married the best man to the bride. I was tempted to tell him that the time may come when he wished I had, but decided that would be another sale lost.

I could not even console myself with a free drink. The publisher had only brought two bottles of that particular white wine, of unknown origin, that seems specially reserved for book launches and retirement parties. I suspect it derives less from a vineyard and more from a laboratory. One bottle he kept for himself and the other disappeared after my Confirmation class came in to ask whether the book would be serialised on TV.

In the end, I bought all 50 copies myself, placed a note in the bookshop window saying that, due to exceptional demand, the print run had been entirely sold out. It has also solved the annual problem of Christmas presents; in your case, a second copy will probably arrive for your birthday too.




