

PET SERVICE





CORNCRAKE

Burton Bradstock Parish Council is delighted to announce its recent purchase of the plot of land known locally as 'Corncrake' following a successful bid during an auction earlier this month. The 7 acre plot of land is adjacent to the Parish Council's playing field and recreation ground in Burton Bradstock and is bordered on one side by the River Bride.

Dr Graham Moody, Chair of the Parish Council, said "The recent auction presented us with an ideal and probably unique opportunity to obtain a key plot of land within the village. Having this land in the ownership of the Parish Council secures its future for community use.

Our wish to purchase the land was discussed at recent Parish Council meetings and has widespread support among parishioners". As well as being used for pasture, the land is already used for recreation purposes. It is a favourite spot for walkers, giving access as it does to a popular route between the village and beach, and provides village school children and others a traffic-free means of access to the playing field from the school. It is also the site of the village's annual duck race.

There are lots of suggestions already about how the land could be used further. Ideas include a riverside walk, picnic area, community orchard, full size football pitch and recreation area for older children. However, no

decisions will be made until parishioners have had a chance to voice their opinions.

Dr Moody said "We will soon be consulting with parishioners on the draft Parish Plan for the next 5 years and the future management and use of Corncrake will be a key part of this plan. We will also be looking at fund raising".

The land is unlikely to ever be used for residential development due to its location in the flood plain and the fact that it sits outside the Defined Development Boundary.

VILLAGE SOCIETY MYSTERY BIG CATS OF BRITAIN

Friday 12th October

Merrily Harpur, the leading UK authority on Mystery Big Cats, gave an interesting, well-illustrated talk on the 1,200 reported sightings per year of 'big cats' described as being like pumas or panthers.



It was 'well-illustrated' to the extent that it appeared to show clearly the signs that big cats had been present, that credible witnesses had seen them and that there were long-range shots that definitely suggested big cats. But against all the welter of circumstantial evidence there was actually no direct, conclusive evidence of a big cat, no pick-up of one from the CTV operations to try to capture their images, and surprisingly no photograph from the hundreds of millions of mobile phones that people carry these days.

Parents on the school run, gamekeepers, policemen, Ofsted inspectors and farmers were among those convinced of clear sightings.

"It would have been so much easier to discount their reports if they weren't such very straightforward, ordinary people," said Merrily.

With the more obvious explanations discounted - including escapes from zoos and deliberate releases following the Dangerous Wild animals Act 2006 - Merrily was stretching for clues in the cultures of other times and places and touched on otherworldly explanations. At this point the Burton

audience seemed to grow more sceptical and took refuge in a reassuring interval cup of tea. The audience remained roughly evenly split on whether Big Cats exist. By the end of the evening only three people had changed their minds as a result of the talk. No further sightings at the time of going to press.



WINTER ROAD TREATMENT

In the event of icy roads this winter the WDDC has committed itself to keeping various roads fit for driving. As main routes it will keep the A35 and the B 3157 clear. In order to give Puncknowle, Swyre and West Bexington drivers access to the B3157 the road though Swyre and Puncknowle up to the junction with Looke Lane, by the village hall, will be treated.

For those wishing to take a more direct route to the A35 the WDDC will also cover a single 'artery route:'

Rectory Lane to the T junction with Litton Lane

Turn right along Litton Lane to Litton Cheney

Through Litton Cheney to Long Bredy

Left at Long Bredy to Littlebredy

At the V junction bear left (Longlands Lane) to A35.

This still leaves areas of Puncknowle with roads not covered by the WDDC plan which will need to be driven along in order to reach the cleared routes. In an attempt to cover this the Parish Council has called forward and stored sufficient salt for the needs of Puncknowle and West Bexington. (Swyre is covered by the WDDC Plan but we have salt in reserve to be used as necessary.)

Just having salt is not sufficient. People to spread it are required. Accordingly, the likely trouble spots in our villages have been identified and volunteers living by each of these trouble spots have taken charge of a sufficient quantity of salt to cover these areas. There are ten such locations in Puncknowle and six in West Bexington. Re-supply of salt, as needed, can be achieved within two hours.

JOBS TO DO DURING DECEMBER AND JANUARY

Keep cropping potted herbs through the winter. Place in a well-lit position under cover, only watering occasionally to prevent the compost drying out. Feed festive poinsettias with a slow release fertiliser capsule to keep them in top condition. Sow pelargonium seeds under cover for next year's plants. Plant shallots; earth up tall Brussels sprout stems to support them; keep checking stored fruit and vegetables. Clean pots and trays with mild disinfectant, clean tools and oil them to prevent them going rusty, have mechanical tools serviced. Keep bird baths topped up with clean water

STAYING SAFE THIS WINTER

Winter and the festive season can be full of dangers. Dorset Fire and Rescue Service is committed to keeping people safe at home. Please follow the advice below to ensure you reduce the dangers of fire or accident in your home or on the roads this year



If there is a fire

- Make sure you have at least one **working** smoke alarm on each level of your house – test it once a week and replace the battery when necessary.
- Discuss with your family, house mates and guests what you would do in the event of a fire. Plan an escape route and keep it clear.
- Keep doors shut at night and know where all your door and window keys are.
- Have a bedtime routine, always making sure heaters and other electrics are turned off, cigarettes and candles are out.
- If there is a fire in your home -

GET OUT, STAY OUT AND CALL THE FIRE BRIGADE OUT (999)

Chimneys and Open Fires

- If you have an open fire your chimney should be regularly cleaned by

professional, registered sweeps. Even if your chimney is lined it needs sweeping at the beginning and end of the season (as a minimum).

- Using dry and seasoned wood is important, as green wood or inappropriate fuel will accelerate build up of soot and combustible materials inside the chimney.
- Stoves and fireplaces should not be overfilled if the flames are extending above the flue opening; your fire is too large.

Electric blankets

- If you have an electric blanket, please ensure that it has been rolled and not folded when stored.
- Make sure any electric blanket is tested each year before use, and replace it if there are any frayed edges or wiring.
- Most modern electric blankets have thermostats in them so will switch off when they reach the set temperature. But always make sure you turn an electric blanket off at the wall before going to sleep.

Gas fires and electric heaters

- Do not place clothes or other flammable materials over heaters.
- Ensure that flammable materials are kept at least three feet away from these heaters and open fires.
- Always turn them off before falling asleep.

Candles and Decorations

- Never place candles near your Christmas tree or furnishings and do not leave them burning unattended.
- Always remember to keep matches, lighters and candles out of the reach of children.
- Keep decorations and greeting cards away from heaters, lights, the fireplace and candles.
- Check that all your Christmas lights conform to the British Standard and never overload electrical sockets – turn them off at the socket before going to bed.

Using the roads in winter

- Make sure your vehicle is in good condition for winter driving:
- Check the tyre depths (minimum tread is 1.60mm) and tyre pressure.
- Check you have anti freeze in your radiator
- Carry de-icer and a ice scraper in your vehicle.
- Keep a warm coat in your vehicle in the event of a breakdown and if possible, carry a charged mobile phone.
- Try not to make unnecessary journeys in bad weather conditions.
- Be aware of the conditions as you drive, avoid unnecessary braking in icy conditions and give other drivers room.

- If you are walking or cycling, make sure you can be seen - wear bright clothing.
- Make sure you have working lights on your bike and use them!!
- Do not take unnecessary risks –remember drivers may not be able to see you as clearly.





Instead of the sermon in church, Francis led the people to a cave. There, to their amazement, was a manger set out with a doll in it, and all around were real animals who watched while Francis told the old story with a new meaning because people could now see it for themselves. The idea grew each year, soon they used a real baby in the crib (an orphan with no home because someone would then willingly take in the 'Christ-baby'). And still today, churches and homes everywhere put up their cribs and wonder anew at the story of God come down to earth, a child like us.

CHRISTMAS BEADS

A nice present to make for someone you love. Cut strips of paper out of Christmas wrapping paper. Each strip 6" (15 cm) long and 3/4" (2 cm) at the widest part. Cut these strips into long triangle shapes so that the tip of the paper is narrower than the base.


Put widest end of the paper strip onto a knitting needle or pencil and begin to wrap it round itself. When you get close to the end, add a very small dab of glue and press it down. Slide the bead off the knitting needle. Repeat. Let the beads dry. Thread the beads onto string or yarn and then tie to make a necklace. You can also make longer lengths into garlands to decorate the Christmas tree.

Use plain colours or the shiny pages of magazines to make beads for all year round.




