FROM THE RECTORY

Traditionally November is a month of Remembrance. This begins with All Saints' Day when we remember all those who have died at a special memorial service. This year our *Annual Memorial Service* will be held at St Mary's Church in Puncknowle on Sunday 3rd November at 3pm. This is a particularly poignant service with the opportunity to read out the names of those who have recently died and remember how much each person meant to us.

Next up, we have Remembrance Sunday and an opportunity to give thanks for the lives of all members of the armed forces who have lost their lives in the line of duty. Remembrance services will be held throughout the Bride Valley this year on Sunday 10th November (Please see back cover for details).

This all may seem a bit too gloomy, but the reality is that even in the midst of life there is death. For Christians though, death isn't the end, it's a new beginning of a life in heaven.

That doesn't mean we can't be sad when someone dies, of course, we'll miss them and their presence here with us, but we do have eternal hope, a sure and certain expectation of life after death for them and for us.

There is a song (also known as a psalm) in the bible about God being our shepherd, the one who looks after his people and is with them in the darkest of places. One of the lines is this:

'Even if I go through the deepest darkness, I will not be afraid, Lord, for you are with me.' Psalm 23.4 (Good News Version)

And, talking of darkness: one of the things we will be doing in Burton Bradstock this year as an alternative to Hallowe'en is holding a Glow Party in the Rectory Gardens. This will be an opportunity for children and parents to have some fun whilst also thinking about what it means that Jesus is the 'Light of the World'. There will be games and glow sticks and hot dogs and hot chocolate and it will be a 'real treat', I'm sure. Watch out for details and also for similar fun events around the valley in the future!



Our Night Sky in November 2019

You might just be able to see brilliant Venus low in the South west after sunset, followed by Jupiter and Saturn, but they will all have set by 8pm.

For the early risers, Mars will be rising in the south east about 6am, followed by Mercury, but both will soon be lost in the dawn sky.

However, you will be able to see the Pleiades and the V of Taurus the bull, whose bright red eye, Aldebaran, will shortly be gazing at Orion rising in the East by 10pm. And so we will have all the winter constellations to enjoy throughout the next few months, and they are all well worthwhile looking at through binoculars.

Jupiter's Loki Patera is the biggest and most active of the lunar volcanos on the Galilean moon Io, which orbits close to the Gas Giant. Based on 20 years of observations, astronomers have been able to narrow down the intervals in-between eruptions. They traced Loki's eruptions back to the 1990s when the volcano erupted once every 540 days, and the 125-mile-wide (202km) volcano was scheduled to erupt in mid-September this year.

Loki is the largest and most powerful volcano on Io and is so bright in the infrared that Earth-bound telescopes can detect the flash. The eruptions on Io also provide the sulphur which has been attributed to the aurora seen at Jupiter's north and south poles, and so Juno, the spacecraft still orbiting Jupiter, might well see an increase in activity.

BRIDE VALLEY GARDENING CLUB



At our meeting in September Neil Lovesey took us through a 'Year at Picket Lane Nursery'. Through photographs he showed the amount of work involved in propagating all the plants they sell (over 1500 varieties of hardy perennials and shrubs), while maintaining the plot, gardens and sales area. **With only 3 people doing the work it was impressive!**

Jobs to do in November

If not done already, bring tender plants such as fuchsias indoors; radically reduce watering of these and other potted plants like citrus and pelargoniums. Slightly tender perennials can be protected from frost by using straw and, if you don't have a frost-free place to overwinter them, protect planted containers using bubble wrap and raise them on pot feet to help prevent waterlogging.

Bring prepared bulbs, such as hyacinths, into a well-lit area for flowers at Christmas. Complete tulip planting by the end of the month. Brighten pots with winter bedding; cover hellebores with a cloche to encourage earlier flowering.

Nip off any yellowing leaves of brassicas to prevent development of fungal diseases. Stake tall stems of Brussels sprouts. To keep parsley providing leaves over winter protect the plants with a cloche or fleece.

Check stored fruit regularly for signs of rot. Plant or divide rhubarb crowns.

Before lighting bonfires check they are clear of sheltering wildlife; clean out bird boxes; regularly clean bird feeders and bird baths.

Keeping On, Keeping On by Alan Bennett (third instalment of his diaries)

Some of us are already fans of Alan “national treasure” Bennett and were prepared to forgive the length (and weight if you had the hardback version) of this most recent instalment of his diaries. Few of us had actually finished it (prize goes to Mary- I think) but most of us had read at least some of it - and a few of us did not even start or gave up early on!

To be fair this was very much a diary miscellany which could be dipped in and out of. One minute he was being observant about birds in the garden, the next gossiping about artist/ celebrity anecdotes, then he would be off with his partner, Rupert, visiting obscure churches or buying endless bric a brac and then he might segue into a story told very much with himself as the joke - all this interspersed with social and political points of view. The Death of King Arthur - a translation and re telling from Malory by Peter Ackroyd.

Sometimes our members cannot make the meeting and will send in their thoughts by email to be shared with the group. What follows is a mini review from one of our members which made all of us laugh.

“ I have reached the last 100 pages of "The Death of King Arthur" and I shall read it to the end. I'm a little surprised that I am still reading it, but I have got into the rhythm of it. When I was a child, I enjoyed reading about King Arthur as a serial in my comic (Probably "Swift" rather than "Girl"!). I can still see the picture of young Arthur drawing the sword from the stone. However, the comic version did not include the blood, the sex, the suffering or the deaths. Peter Ackroyd has more than made up for that, and I presume it was all in Malory's version.

I was interested to see how the parts of the story which were familiar to me, fitted into Ackroyd's version. I hadn't read much about the Holy Grail before, so that was interesting. However, I can't say that I would recommend this book to other readers, and it has neither expanded my horizons nor made me a better human being.





Dorset Community Transport is shortlisted for national Community Transport Award



Local charity Dorset Community Transport (DCT) is delighted to announce that it has been shortlisted for this year's [Community Transport Awards](#) for its crucial work towards ending rural isolation for local people. Organised by the Community Transport Association, the awards celebrate excellence in the community transport sector across the UK and highlight those who have gone above and beyond for their local communities.

This year, DCT joins just two other organisations – Fellrunner Village Bus, and Llanwrtyd Wells Community Transport – as a finalist in the ‘Serving Rural Communities’ category, which highlights organisations “doing excellent work to enable people living in rural communities to access services that they may otherwise be denied”.


The winner will be announced on 12 November at a Community Transport Awards dinner.

DCT’s submission highlighted its work in keeping local bus services 97 and 88 – which are primarily used by elderly people who have no other means of travelling to market towns – up and running following council funding cuts.

DCT gave the example of 73-year-old passenger Mary Head, who is totally reliant on DCT’s “little green bus”. She says, “Where I live is very isolated, and when I found out that the council was cutting my usual route I was mortified. It actually made me feel really depressed. “For someone living alone, who is perhaps not able to walk very well and has not got family around, you need to be able to get out and have something to look forward to.” DCT provided further examples of how they help people in rural communities: from helping those with mobility difficulties travel to vital health appointments, to enabling pupils at rural schools to experience enriching extra-curricular activities and trips that would otherwise not have been possible. For instance, thanks to DCT, pupils at Cerne Abbas CE VC First School and Spetisbury CE Primary School now attend swimming lessons, choir practices, science activities and more.

Tim Christian, general manager at DCT, said: “Many Dorset villages are not served by any buses whatsoever, and often residents have no access to basic amenities. “At DCT, we have been working hard since 2011 to offer people – particularly those who are vulnerable or socially isolated – a means of getting out and staying connected to their community. I’m very proud that our work has been recognised in the shortlist for a national award, and particularly in the ‘Serving Rural Communities’ category, because that is exactly what we do.”
