## Jobs to do during December and January

Deadhead winter flowering pansies to prolong flowering; mulch around hellebores with bark chips to help keep leaves clean. Finish clearing beds and cover bare soil with a layer of well-rotted compost or manure. Clear leaves away from woody stems and perennials to prevent a build-up of moisture.

Clean pots, trays and plant supports with mild disinfectant; clean, oil and sharpen tools. Keep checking stored fruit and vegetables for signs of decay. In January sow chillies in a heated propagator. Sow early carrot varieties under fleece and plant new rhubarb crowns. Continue to winter prune apples and pears. Use cloches to warm the soil for early seed sowing. Continue to ensure that birds have food and water, especially in frozen conditions.

## Bride Valley Book Group - November Report

### “The Disappearing Act of Esme Lennox” by Maggie O’Farrell

Most of us really enjoyed reading this book finding it quite a page turner.

The novel spans most of the 20th century and tells the story of two sisters from a colonial background in India. After a family tragedy they relocate to the previous home of their parents in Scotland. As they grow older one sister is happy to be docile and compliant whilst the other is headstrong and rebellious. Needless to say things do not go well for the less malleable sister.

The novel reminds us sharply about the unforgiving attitudes and morals of early 20th century - ignorance and judgemental prejudice all contribute to the book’s themes - the treatment of the mentally ill, the somewhat loose definition of mental illness itself, the low expectations of female education, illegitimacy, sexual assault, the consequences of defying social convention.

We were a bit divided over the sections where interior monologues formed the narrative - often broken off in a fragmentary and unattributed style. Some of us lost patience and pushed on regardless - others turned the pages back to try and “join up the dots”. However we did agree that this technique filled in important gaps in the story, especially key events in the background of Esme and her sister Kitty.

Several of us found the ending unsatisfactory - in which Esme wreaks her revenge on the sister who betrayed her - now deeply demented in a care home. This particular point prompted quite a discussion!

## Our Night Sky in December 2019

Jupiter will be setting shortly after Sunset, with Saturn following shortly afterwards. Venus will be the brightest object in the evening sky, setting at about 7pm by the middle of the month. The rest of the night sky will be dominated by the winter constellations with Orion being the most conspicuous.

Quasars are among the brightest and most distant known celestial objects and are crucial to understanding the early universe. They were discovered only about 50 years ago because the distance makes the signals so faint. The tiny, point-like glimmers are actually signals from galactic nuclei outshining their host galaxies. Quasars live only in galaxies with supermassive black holes — black holes that contain billions of times the mass of the sun. Although light cannot escape from the black hole itself, some signals can break free around its edges. While some dust and gas fall into the black hole, other particles are accelerated away from it at near the speed of light. The particles stream away from the black hole in jets above and below it, transported by one of the most powerful particle accelerators in the universe. Quasars emit energies which exceed the total of the light of all the stars within a galaxy. They are the brightest objects in the universe, they shine anywhere from 10 to 100,000 times brighter than the Milky Way. Quasars are capable of emitting hundreds or even thousands of times the entire energy output of our galaxy, making them some of the most luminous and energetic objects in the entire universe, Quasars are part of a class of objects known as active galactic nuclei (AGN). Other classes include Seyfert galaxies and blazars. All three require supermassive black holes to power them.

Most of the more than 2,000 known quasars existed in the early life of the Universe. In December 2017, the most distant quasar was found more than 13 billion light-years from Earth. {1 Light Year equals about 5.88 trillion miles (9.5 trillion km). Scientists observed the quasar as it appeared only 690 million years after the Big Bang. Quasars this young can reveal information about how galaxies evolved over time. The distances involved are mind blowing, and the fact that Quasars can be observed so far away makes one realise just how brilliant these objects must be.

On which thought provoking fact, I will close this article, the last of a year's worth for the Bride Valley News. May I wish all my readers a Very Happy Christmas and a prosperous year to come.



## Celebration of 20 years of Open the Book

You might have seen balloons bobbing outside the church gates on Sunday 3rd November. This was to celebrate nationally 20 years of Open the book (OtB) in our Songs of Praise Service. Here in Burton Bradstock we have been doing it for well over 10 years. OtB is a project that offers primary school children an opportunity to see dramatisations of major stories of the Bible in a weekly short Collective Worship Assembly. Each school has a team drawn from interdenominational local churches who go into schools on a regular basis. The children delight in these sessions as they learn about God's love through the message of the Bible and Christian values that provide a moral framework for their lives. From a retired couple in Bedford in 1999, who sought to bring the Bible to their local primary school children, OtB spread very quickly and in 2007 a national charity was formed. It grew so large that they were unable to deal with the project and in 2013 The Bible Society took it over. There are now 3000 primary schools in the U.K. who use Open the Book and it has also been adopted in African countries – it is particularly strong in Ghana.

At the service some of the OtB team were joined by five children to present the story of The Good Samaritan. Children later read prayers and we were treated to two Bible stories written by children in their own words which were part of a national OtB competition. There were other entries of art and stories for this displayed in the church for people to view whilst they enjoyed a variety of homemade cakes and tea or filter coffee.

#### Corncrake - The Fence

Dear fellow residents and visitors,

A number of people have commented about the fence across Corncrake, both on Facebook and in Parish Council meetings.

**This is the Parish Council's response:**

We understand the concerns of some about walking through fields where livestock is present and we are sorry that this has caused anxiety to regular walkers.



No arrangements have been made for grazing as yet. If or when we do agree a grazing licence with a local farmer it will be for a small number of stock for short periods of time to graze off the grass growth in Sept/Oct and again, if necessary in early March. It is important to stress there will be no grazing animals between mid March and mid September. It maybe that grazing is only necessary for 2 or 3 weeks in the autumn and again in the spring. Please be assured that any grazing cattle will be placid breeds in family groups considered safe for the public, including children and dogs, to walk through.

Many people no doubt remember that Corncrake was grazed until 2015. The Parish council was proactive in buying it a few years earlier to ensure that the fields were secured for public enjoyment. Otherwise, it is highly likely that the area would not be open to free access and may even have been lost to development.

Some regular users feel they have not been asked their opinion, but the PC consulted widely in developing the Corncrake Management Plan 2015-2020, which included grazing animals, and fencing in the position now installed. The fence protects the trees from cattle - and also means it is possible to walk through Corncrake north - south without entering the grazed area at all. The gates will be fitted with secure closers before any grazing takes place.

Many people contributing to the Parish Plan asked for it to be managed as a 'wildlife area'. Volunteers have contributed hours to planting fruit trees, laying hedges, scything grassland and trying to diversify the wildflowers. If we are to be more successful with creating a wildflower meadow we need to remove the competing grass growth so that the flowering plants have a chance to grow in the spring. We take a hay cut in July but getting machinery onto the site in wetter times (Sept/March) is not practical and grazing is the best method for reducing the grass and creating openings in the sward for flower seeds.

Involvement from all users is welcomed. The Corncrake Management Plan is due for review next year. Any alternative proposals for management of Corncrake can be considered as part of this review.
