BRIDE VALLEY CAR SERVICE



The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends.

Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £1.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

BVCS simply provides door-to-door transport and cannot be responsible for assisting with clients' medical or mobility needs. Patients with complex transport needs for hospital appointments should contact the NHS Non-Emergency Patient Transport service.

FROM THE RECTORY

This week we started our Breakfast Church at Shipton Gorge and it was really lovely to be with people of all ages and listen in to their conversations while discussing creation.

I've also been to the Big Q Church after school in Litton Cheney and had a great time in Burton Bradstock yesterday when the reception class came into church to find out what vicars do. This morning we had our first school service at church in St Mary's LC for a long time.

Children are amazing and teach us so much. Not only do they have lots of questions, they also have lots of answers, often with a simplistic, not overly complicated, view of life. I find this refreshing and completely understand why Jesus said: ***"I'm telling you, once and for all, that unless you return to square one and start over like children, you're not even going to get a look at the kingdom, let alone get in."*** Matthew 18.3 The Message

The other day I came across this modern parable and thought I'd share it:

Soon after Peter and Penny were born, their parents began taking them to the local swimming pool every weekend. The parents were enthusiastic swimmers, and they hoped their children would be keen swimmers too.

Of course, Peter and Penny were not allowed to go into the swimming pool itself; they were looked after in a little room right beside the pool. Sometimes they cried because they wanted to stay with their parents, but that wasn't allowed because they might disturb the adult swimmers. Besides, they were too young to understand swimming, and they wouldn't appreciate it fully.

When Peter and Penny were three years old, they were allowed to go to another room just down the hall from the swimming pool. There they heard stories from the Swimmer's Manual, and they coloured pictures of people swimming.

When they were six years old, Peter and Penny went to another big room – a big room with lots of children. Here they began to get really serious about swimming. For the first 10 or 15 minutes, they were allowed to take off their shoes and socks and splash around in the wading pool. Then they went to classes with other children their own age to learn more about swimming. They were taught by some very dedicated people who loved swimming, but

who hardly ever swam themselves any more because they were busy with the children.

By the time Penny and Peter were 13, they had studied the Swimmer's Manual in even more detail and had learned the rules of the swimming pool off by heart: "You shall not run on the deck. You shall not bring flotation devices into the pool area ..." They had also learned about the properties of water, the muscles used in swimming and the various swimming strokes. They had studied great swimmers of the past, including Olympic medal winners. They had heard about Canadian swimmers who went to other countries such as Africa or India to teach swimming, and they had seen slides of groups of African or Indian swimmers standing beside their swimming pools. On special occasions, Peter and Penny had been allowed to go with their parents into the pool as long as they didn't splash around too much and disturb the other swimmers or bother the life-guard.

At last, Penny and Peter finished swimming school and were allowed to accompany their parents into the swimming pool every week. They tried it a few times. Much to the disappointment of their parents, Peter and Penny had lost interest and preferred to do other things instead. (From God, Kids, & Us by Janet Marshall Eibner and Susan Graham Walker.)

Martinstown Cricket – 2021 Season

After a reduced 2020 season we returned in 2021 with a full season of games across all formats.

It was certainly worth the wait with the club achieving one of its best results.

Leading the way was the club's First Team who finished third in the competitive Dorset Premier League, their best ever position. On the way the team won games against top opposition and up until the last game of the season remained in contention for the title. In their final game they hit an astonishing 436 runs – a club record.

Meanwhile our Second and Evening teams put in robust performances in their respective leagues. Equally it was wonderful to see youth cricket returning to the ground. For the early years there were the All Stars and Dynamo programmes, attracting both girls and boys whilst the under 15s managed an undefeated season, with cup success for both the under 13s and under 11s.

Our youngsters again featured heavily in the adult teams, with often at least eight of the first team being comprised of home-grown talent. There was further representation at county level..

Bride Valley Gardening Club



Sadly, we had to cancel our planned meeting in September, as our speaker was unable to attend and we were unable to find a replacement in the time. We are, however, planning to go ahead with our meeting on 18th October - 'Mediterranean Bulbs' with Chris Lovell. Although restrictions have been lifted people have expressed concern about meeting in Puncknowle because of its size therefore **we will be meeting at 7.30pm in LATCH** – the Hall in Litton Cheney.

Jobs to do in October

Overwinter tender perennials indoors; lift and store tender summer bulbs and tubers.

Sow sweet peas in a cold greenhouse or frame.

Lift cannas, trim them, pot up and store in a frost-free place.

Plant cyclamen, and continue to plant spring bulbs (except tulips which should wait until November or early December).

Plant out spring bedding such as pansies, wallflowers and primroses.

Divide congested clumps of hardy perennials.

Clear fallen leaves from your evergreen plants to allow more light in and keep them healthy over the winter.

Clean greenhouses ready to overwinter plants.

Clear old crops from the kitchen garden then plant garlic and sow hardy broad beans and peas under cloches.

Clear perennial weeds and improve the condition of the soil by adding organic mulches of well-rotted manure and compost.

Sow green manure on bare vegetable beds to deter weeds over winter.

Bring pots of herbs under cover to maintain crops during the autumn.

THE BRIDE VALLEY BOOK CLUB



MUDLARKING by Lara Maiklem

There was almost wholesale acclaim for Lara Maiklem's "Mudlarking". Some of us do prefer reading non fiction but despite this we all found something to admire in this unusual and fascinating book. For some of us it was an outstanding read and several members said they planned on buying their own copy for re reading at more leisure. Some of us reflected on the different pace required for reading books like this - so full of details and information - this was a book which required a good attention span and a willingness to absorb a density of facts.

Lara Maiklem gave much praise to her own mother for encouraging her to really "look" at the outside world - something which she felt had formed the basis of her many years as a mudlark on the Thames. The book has a simple geographical line of travel - from Teddington Lock out to the Essex estuary beyond Tilbury. Each section tells wonderful stories of what can be found in these locations, the history and characteristics of particular riverscapes and the treasures found there by mudlarks, including our author. At times she allows her imagination full rein to embroider narratives around these found artefacts - but at other times she does her research diligently and discovers astonishing information relating to the finds. Mudlarking is not a glamorous hobby and occasionally she has found herself in real danger despite her natural caution and awareness of the tides and currents. We agreed that this book was beautifully written, seemingly effortless and without artifice. It encompassed just enough personal detail to convince us of her passion.

Some of us had river tales to tell, living next to the river, crossing it as a daily commuter and even for one of us once mudlarking herself! However as the book progresses in an easterly direction the tone becomes more sombre as the author makes us aware of the inexorable tide of London's filth and detritus- from west to east - and the long term legacy of damage to the river and its environment.

We all enjoyed hearing Jackie's review which I have copied below:-

I have thoroughly enjoyed the book from beginning to end. I found the style effortless and - dare I say - fluid (like the river - pun intended!) in its author's enthusiasm and curiosity very infectious and her writing style

drifts from one idea or fact to another. Structuring the book by the geography of the river and her working areas made sense, but what I loved is that the structure was only the framework - there were layers of stories, personal history, surprises etc in each section - just like uncovering the treasures she found. I found it quite fascinating how obsessed she was with the river and - even from a very early age- with the history of objects and the detective work that is involved in her discoveries - I can imagine mudlarking being very addictive!

I was beginning to look around for my wellies and trowel, and the train timetable for London, when I reached the last two chapters and was shocked into reality. The environmental hazards and looming disaster that our recent past has deposited were a sobering end to the book - and rightly so. That end note somehow - for me - changed the book from an entertainment to a serious polemic (and none the worse for that).

Our Night Sky in October 2021

Venus will be setting in the south west shortly after sunset, while Saturn and Jupiter will follow suit about midnight, so make the most of these delightful planets.

To compensate, the first of the winter constellations will be making an appearance in the east, with Orion showing himself just as the two gas planets leave us in the west.

Ingenuity, the Martian helicopter, has been carrying out ever more demanding flights and its ninth was, according to the scientists operating it, “a nail-biting affair”!

Flight 9 was not like the flights that came before it. It broke records for flight duration and cruise speed, and it nearly quadrupled the distance flown between two airfields. But what really set the flight apart was the terrain that Ingenuity had to negotiate during its 2 minutes and 46 seconds in the air – an area called “Séítah” that would be difficult to traverse with a ground vehicle like the Perseverance rover. This flight was also explicitly designed to have science value by providing the first close view of major science targets that the rover will not reach for quite some time.

On a later flight, Ingenuity will send back colour images that Perseverance’s scientists are looking forward to studying. Captured in those images are rock outcrops that show contacts between the major geologic units on Jezero Crater’s floor. They also include a system of fractures the Perseverance team calls “Raised Ridges,” which the rover’s scientists hope to visit in part to investigate whether an ancient subsurface habitat might be preserved there.

Finally, they are hoping the colour images will provide the closest look yet at “Pilot Pinnacle,” a location featuring outcrops that some team members think may record some of the deepest water environments in old Lake Jezero.

When you consider that this helicopter is operating millions of miles away from Earth, in an atmosphere only just capable of supporting it, and having each flight pre planned so that it can operate autonomously, the achievements the scientists have made are astonishing.

It gives me great pleasure to be writing my first piece for the Bride Valley News as the new Headteacher of Burton Bradstock Primary School. I have worked in education for a number of years as a class teacher and leader, most recently as the deputy headteacher of Bridport Primary School. Working within the Minerva Learning Trust enabled me to work closely with Claire Staple last term in order to 'learn the school' and hit the ground running!

We have had a great start to the Autumn term with the children returning to school happily after their summer break. 15 new children have joined us in reception, meaning that we are now up to 89 children in the whole school. All the children have settled into school routines quickly and are actively engaged in their learning. We also welcomed some new, and familiar faces to our staffing team. Our Year 5/6 teacher, Mrs Vardell-Pauley has returned from maternity leave, Mrs Lucy Herbert joins us for 1 day a week in Year 5/6 and we also had Mrs Michelle Sage join our support staff team. Miss Claudia Granger, our school receptionist, sadly leaves us this week but we know she will keep in touch and the staff and I wish her all the best in her new venture.

After the restrictions of the past 18 months, the children are enjoying being able to return to some of the more normal activities associated with school life. At break and lunchtimes, the children are able to mix outside rather than just in their class groups. They have thoroughly enjoyed this, and it has been lovely to see the games that they are playing together. We are also having small collective worship in our school hall. Initially, these are just for our Key Stage groups, but it has been great to meet physically rather than virtually and cautiously begin to return to normality.

Our cross-curricular learning continues with a focus on offering a diverse range of opportunities for the children. This half term, our topics are:

EYFS – Me and my community	Year 1 and 2 – Moon Zoom

We are hoping that normal Autumn term events such as the Harvest Festival will be able to go ahead, and I look forward to sharing more of the exciting things that the children have been up to next time.

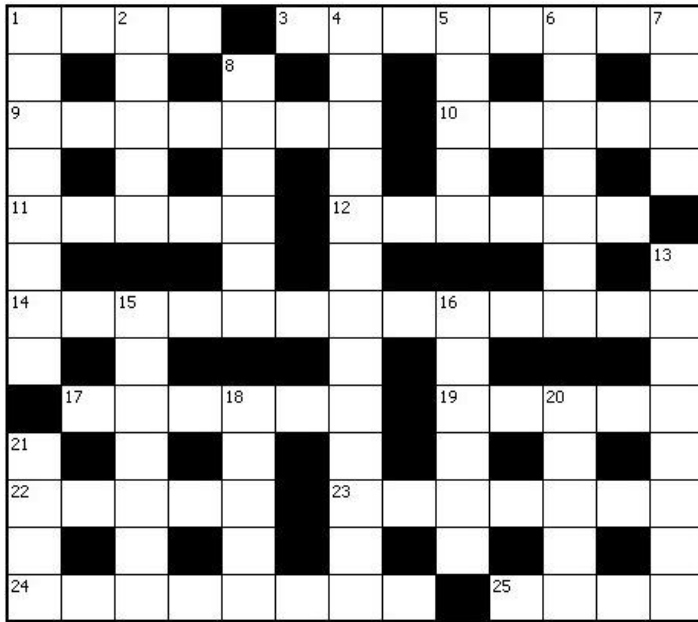
Friday Night Fish and Chips will continue for the foreseeable future, so you can get your "takeaway" here every week, or eat in with a beer or glass of wine if you prefer.

Shipton Gorge Climate Change Action Group

The Parish Council have acknowledged that we need to plan so that Shipton Gorge will be resilient in the face of climate change. They have actioned this group.

This meeting is open to all in the village to contribute. Maybe you have expertise, suggestions or are just interested on what actions we can take as a village to reduce our carbon footprint and put in place, to make us more ready for the future changes.

The Centre for Sustainable Energy have developed an Impact tool so every parish council can see their carbon footprint. <https://impact-tool.org.uk/>

Below is an example of what we can be looking at but this is a **village** action group so please come along to the meeting so that any plans we make start from you the parishioners.

- Consumption and waste e.g. Refuse, reduce, reuse, recycle
- Travel e.g. Buses, cycle lanes, footpaths, preparing for electric cars
- Housing emissions e.g. LED lightbulbs, insulation, replacing boilers with new greener technology
- Food and diet e.g. Buy local, eat more veg, local, grass-fed meat, grow your own
- + a link to Shipton Heritage group as a way of promoting diversity and offsetting with tree planting etc.

The Queen's Green Canopy initiative is being supported by the Parish Council who are collating a list of planned trees that will be planted during this winter as part of the Green Canopy. We hope to be able to plant at least 70 trees and already have pledges of trees from local farmers and Shipton Heritage who are together hoping to plant a substantial number.

If residents would like to take part by pledging to plant a tree in their gardens then do let us know. If you don't have room in your own garden then perhaps you could consider sponsoring a tree to be planted on your behalf? A record of all the trees planted will be made public to show how Shipton Gorge was involved in increasing the number of trees in the village to commemorate the Jubilee and also help the environment.
