By definition:

Vulnerable adult – An adult (aged 18+) is classed as vulnerable when they are receiving one of the following services: health care, relevant personal care, social care work, assistance in relation to general household matters by reason of age, illness or disability, relevant assistance in the conduct of their own affairs, or conveying (due to age, illness or disability). **Child or young person** - A person under the age of 18 years old.

Safeguarding is always important in our Churches, and is the key to keeping our churches open and safe places for everyone. We promote fully, making our churches safer places, using the House of Bishops guidance and policies. The Bride Valley Benefice has a strict recruitment policy that we follow, and everyone within our churches receives safeguarding training that is relevant to their role and have regular DBS checks.

The BVCS is a volunteer scheme offering residents of the Bride Valley transport to and from medical appointments when they are unable to drive themselves or be driven by relatives or friends. Clients are charged a mileage fee (currently 50p per mile) plus a standard charge (currently £2.00 per journey). Because the service depends on the availability of volunteer drivers, clients are asked to give as much notice as possible – we are unlikely to be able to respond to requests within 48 hours of an appointment.

Our Night Sky in June 2023

Venus will be setting in the North West about midnight in the middle of the month, while Saturn will be rising in the East about 0200, followed by Jupiter about 0300.



Shining like a brilliant beacon

amidst a sea of galaxies, Arp 220 lights up the night sky in the latest view from NASA's James Webb Space Telescope. Actually two spiral galaxies in the process of merging, Arp 220 glows brightest in <u>infrared light</u>, making it an ideal target for Webb. It is an ultra-luminous infrared galaxy (ULIRG) with a luminosity of more than a trillion suns. In comparison, our Milky Way galaxy has a much more modest luminosity of about ten billion suns.

Located 250 million light-years away, it is the nearest ULIRG and the brightest of the three galactic mergers closest to Earth. The collision of the two spiral galaxies began about 700 million years ago. It sparked an enormous burst of <u>star formation</u>. About 200 huge star clusters reside in a packed, dusty region about 5,000 light-years across (about 5 percent of the Milky Way's diameter).

On the outskirts of this merger, Webb reveals faint tidal tails, or material drawn off the galaxies by gravity. Organic material represented in reddishorange appears in streams and filaments across Arp 220. The existence of organic material elsewhere in the Universe is always exciting, since life as we know it, requires organic material to form, as well as water.

The James Webb telescope has been extraordinarily successful since its launch, and I do urge you to view some of the outstanding images it has sent back, delving further back into the history of the Universe than any other telescope before it. We are so fortunate to live in such exciting astronomical and cosmological times.

The Bride Valley Book Group Review - "Villette" by Charlotte Brontë

It is not often we read classic novels and we found a great deal to say about this last work by Charlotte - published just two years before her death. We reminded ourselves of the litany of loss and grief which had overtaken her family. Several of us had visited Haworth Parsonage and found the Brontë family house very atmospheric.

Villette is probably her most autobiographical novel reflecting her family tragedy and at least two unrequited attachments before a late marriage to her father's curate. Villette is a long and complex novel and most of us intuited different aspects of the story as we read. Two of us (gold stars to Ro and Biddy) actually finished it before our meeting! The character of Lucy Snowe is fascinating - in many ways a woman ahead of her time - unmarried and working as a teacher in a Belgian girls' school. However, Lucy is not what she seems and almost certainly not as she implies via the first-person narrative. We never get to understand what tragedy has befallen her family - this is one of several key pieces of information she chooses to omit. Villette is not an easy read, the prose is floridly dense and the novel's pace is slow - relying on Lucy's interior monologue to inform the reader. This intriguing novel poses so many questions - it is no surprise that it has divided critics and been the source of controversial literary debate amongst feminists.

Our discussion was much more wide-ranging than the above suggests but hopefully this gives you a flavour. So what was Villette about....mismatched marriages, female archetypes, female outsiders, the depths of female imagination?

St. Michael and All Angels

Anyone walking through the Churchyard recently may have noticed that the appearance of the base of the War Memorial has been transformed by a professional makeover, carried out by the local stonemason firm (and advertiser in the magazine) of Grassby and Sons. The memorial commemorates the seven men of (or connected with) the village who did not return from the First World War, but over the years their names and other parts of the inscriptions had become worn and nearly illegible – that is the case no longer, and the restored base should last for many years.

All the seven dead were in the Army, in four different regiments, including 3 in the Dorsets and 2 in the New Zealand forces, with ranks ranging from Lieutenant Colonel to Private, and they were killed in France (4), at Gallipoli (2) and elsewhere in the Middle East (1). When the Memorial was designed, someone who obviously knew their Bible appended a text from Ezekiel: "I will seek out my sheep and deliver them out of all places where they have been scattered."

A local familial descendant of one of the fallen has generously sponsored the improvement, so we extend all thanks to him and everyone else concerned in organising it.

The open season of the Walled Garden is upon us, and the efforts and skills of Liz Eaton and her team of volunteers can be admired on Wednesday and Sunday afternoons through the summer – well worth doing.

Parish council vacancy

Puncknowle and Swyre Parish Council needs two new members for its team that represent the areas of Puncknowle, Swyre and West Bexington.
