FUNERALS

The funeral of the late **Betty Clynes** was held on Friday, 18th October. A simple ceremony was held at Weymouth crematorium at which tributes were read from members of the family going back, and from friends and neighbours who knew and loved Betty in her days in Burton Bradstock. All spoke of her warmth and her ability to listen with love and sympathy. She loved her sunlit garden and expeditions to the Hive Café. She was delightedly involved in the life of the village for many years. The congregation gathered back at her cottage after the service where tales were fondly told.

On 25th of October the funeral of Linda Samways was held at St Mary's



Church. Puncknowle. This was a large service for one as large as life itself. Linda was born a Laver and so of an extensive local family herself. When she married Victor she was always going to be at the centre of village life. A tribute of her life from her

daughter Sarah was read by the Revd Bob Thorn, before Mike Hannam spoke of family times. Her cake making was recalled along with many scrapes and adventures of younger days. For some time Linda had run the local shop at the hub of village life. She died all too young after a long illness bravely borne, but was nevertheless a Mother to 4 children, a grandmother to 10 and a great grandmother to 2. She will be greatly and sadly missed.

The ashes of **Janet Patricia Perry** were interred in the churchyard of St Mary's, Burton Bradstock in the morning of 4th November. Janet spent some of her childhood and early years in Burton Bradstock. Mrs Helen Hobbs, her daughter led the mourners who laid the remains to rest near those of Janet's parents, Mr and Mrs Hobbs.



That same day the funeral of **Mary Ward** was held in St Mary's, Burton Bradstock. Mary was one of four sisters whose childhood found its delight in Burton and down by the beach. She was an aircraft plotter during the war, stationed in Belfast where she met John, soon to be her husband. After the war they had a spell

in West Africa, before returning home to run pubs and developed a horticultural business. At last they came home to their beloved Burton Bradstock as the children grew up and away and left home. Still Mary was the delighted heart of the family, as she was a great friend to people in the village. Her life knew a terrible sorrow when her son, Patrick died out of time. His ashes were laid to rest in the cemetery with his Mother in the grave they now share with John.

Rest eternal grant unto them O Lord, And let light perpetual shine upon them.

On Friday 1st of November (All Saint's Day) our friend **Leonard**John Green was buried at the age of 86yrs with his wife in the
Burton Church Burial Grounds. Len's family gathered together, in
between the showers, with a group of friends from Burton
Bradstock for a short service of committal - the main service having been
held the day before at St Marys' Kidlington, Oxford, where Len had been in
a care home.

Len & Wendy came to Burton Bradstock a number of years ago and became very involved in the village and church. Both were Bell ringers, Len was a regular participant in the village plays and pantos - his last part being the lion in the Wizard of Oz. Children loved Len who always gave sweets to them at the Church Fete whether they had 'splatted' the rat or not.

Len was an example of a faith, loyally attending the church services, even coming to Sunday service a few days after Wendy died, and was always ready to participate in the Family Services.

Our prayers are with Len's children Debbie, Jonathan, and Lorraine and their families.

For all the saints who from their labours rest, who thee by faith before the world confessed, thy name of Jesus be for ever blest. Allelujah.



Vera Hirst went to join her beloved husband George as she was buried in the churchyard of Holy Trinity Church, Swyre on 6th November, following a service in the Church. Her children, Andrew and Gina led the mourning in a church filled with family,

friends from the village and beyond, the churches, the M.U., the W.I., and her nursing colleagues. All came to remember before God a true Christian woman whose life was filled with faith, hope and love. wine (also provided by volunteers) in the Village Hall, and we hope for a good congregation from both villages.





UPDATE ON SUPERFAST BROADBAND FOR THE VILLAGE

As you may know, we had well over 200 registrations (DCC can't tell us how many exactly!). So we did extremely well. In July, DCC signed a contract with BT to provide Superfast Broadband to as much of rural Dorset as they can. DCC says that the aim is to reach 97 per cent of Dorset premises by the end of 2016. (The Contract actually says 95.6% of

premises will have access to >=24Mb/sec, 97% will have access to Fibre to Cabinet >2Mb/sec, 100% access to <=2Mb/sec by Sept 2016).

So far, it seems as though they are still planning/surveying. Although they have not announced who will and who will not get it, they have published a map on their web site

http://mapping.dorsetforyou.com/superfast/availability/map.

As you may also know, the fibre cable will only go as far as the "green cabinets" in the various roads (where they exist). This means that you potentially get faster speeds, but:

- a) You need a new contract with an ISP (Internet Service Provider) for them to transfer your connection to fibre and
- b) for those premises exploiting fibre-to-the-cabinet (FTTC), once you sign a contract with an ISP for the SFBB high speed connection, the connection between the existing roadside cabinet (to which your phone

line is already connected) and the new cabinet (into which the fibre comes) is activated. As far as we are aware, you do not need to involve a contractor - it is all done by BT on behalf of the ISP as part of the activation process provided by the ISP when you sign up to SFBB.

Of course, if you want to pay for fibre to the premises, when it is not provided as part of this contract, then we would expect you to have to pay although even then it might well be included in the ISP's activation charge when you sign up with them for this.

We will continue to press Dorset County Council for further information. More information on http://www.dorsetforyou.com/superfast

A Talk on Lev Kerbel by Air Commodore Phil Wilkinson

The October presentation by Air Commodore Phil Wilkinson resulted from a chance meeting in Moscow between the Speaker and Lev Kerbel, arguably Russia's best sculptor of modern times. The meeting turned into a lasting friendship which allowed the speaker to give insights which drifted

away from the official Russian record of the sculptor's life.

Born at the time of the Russian revolution Lev Kerbel's works ranged from patriotic busts of war heroes of all nationalities from his wartime experiences in Murmansk, to titanic memorials to Stalin, Lenin and subsequent Russian leaders that dominate many Russian sites today.

What could have been a dry and technical presentation actually produced a fascinating, informative and witty insight into both sculptor and Russian life. The length of the applause at the end of the presentation was testimony to the level of audience interest, a very rewarding evening.

This is a light hearted look by Andrew Dickson at his life in Music, using musical instruments he has collected from around the world. The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tongue-incheek letters From 'Uncle Eustace': On how to make the most of carol singing

> The Rectory St James the Least of All

My dear Nephew Darren

Carol singing is not what it used to be. My fond memories of a group of choristers, muffled in scarves and overcoats, carrying lanterns and walking from door to door in the snow, as they sang 'While shepherds watched ...' had to be suddenly revised when I saw your own music group, in T-shirts inscribed with 'Jesus loves You', singing 'Little donkey', in your shopping centre. I suspect any money you raised would just about have paid for the electricity used to power your banks of electronic equipment. Singing in the main square of the Centre next to the fountain may have looked good, but it seemed to mean that the choirmen were obliged to make constant trips to the lavatory.

Here at St. James the Least of All, carol singing is regarded as a staff perk for the choir; the year when the Boys' Brigade tried to break their monopoly was suppressed with a ruthlessness that would have impressed Genghis Khan.

Our annual carol-singing route involves months of meticulous planning. We find that a transparent collection box is vital, so that donors can see what earlier patrons have given. This means that those who are bound to put in notes must be visited first - 'pour encourager les autres'. It also needs a detachable base, so that if coppers are given, they can be removed from sight before the next call.

Those homes that contain several children are visited just after bed-time, so that parents will give generously simply to get the choir to go somewhere else. Veiled threats to stay and sing more carols (unless they give generously) are usually very

effective. Getting whoever looks the most innocent and photogenic to ring the bell and ask for money is a far more subtle way of ensuring a donation than planting any number of mafia lookalikes (such as our church treasurer) on the doorstep.

The choir always finishes its evening at the local pub - but again, the timing has to be carefully managed. Too early and there will only be the landlord, his wife and their Labrador to listen; too late and people will be so full of Christmas cheer that any carols will be hi-jacked and become the equivalent of back-of-the bus rugby songs.

I am never entirely sure what charity our choristers collect for, but the fact that all the men return to the pub once the boys are taken home does rather give one pause for thought.

St NICHOLAS Feast Day 6 December

St Nicholas was the bishop of Myra, in Asia Minor, in the fourth century. Lots of stories are told of his kindness and generosity. He is the patron saint of Russia, children, scholars, merchants and sailors.

One legend tells of his secret gifts to three daughters from a poor family. It is said that he threw 3 purses of gold down the chimney where they landed in the girls' stockings which they had hung up to dry in front of the fire. STOCKING DECORATIONS

Fold the felt in half and cut out two simple stocking shapes. Sew these together with a simple running stitch, leaving the top edge open. Sew a loop of ribbon to the top of the stocking.

Now you can decorate the stocking with scraps of felt, lace, buttons or sequins. Glue them on carefully and leave to dry. You could even try writing a name in glue and sprinkling on glitter to cover it.

This would be nice to give as a present with a little present or sweet inside or to hang on the Christmas tree


decoration. You can make them any size you like.



JOBS TO DO DURING DECEMBER AND JANUARY

This is the time of year to ensure everything is prepared for next spring; continue winter digging, clean pots and trays with mild disinfectant, clean tools and oil them to prevent them going rusty, have mechanical tools serviced. Keep 'a look out' for weed seedlings as you wander round the garden and clear them as they appear. Clear leaves from the crowns of herbaceous perennials and alpines as they are vulnerable to rot in prolonged damp conditions. Sow pelargonium seeds under cover for next year's plants. Plant shallots; earth up tall Brussels sprout stems to support them; keep checking stored fruit and vegetables. Keep feeding the birds and ensure they have access to clean water, especially in frozen conditions



DECEMBER SKY AT NIGHT—ISON APPROACHES

December could be the best month to see a comet this century. Comet C/2012 S1 ISON has already travelled for many years on its one stop journey. The question is will it survive the gravitation of the sun when it reaches perihelion (closest to the sun) on 28th November? And will it reach its peak brightness then too?



Through almost all of December it will be visible with the naked eye so make sure you get outside, it could be the only comet you'll ever see. This month is the perfect opportunity to capture the comet with a camera of any level. You can also capture the comet through a telescope or binoculars. You'll find it on December 22nd in between Hercules and Corona Borealis/the crown. It is quite hard to find these constellations but on a clear night past 10pm, there should be a little group of stars that are the shape of a semi-circle below Ursa Major.
