Time like an ever rolling stream

When Big Ben strikes midnight on 31st December 2018 we leave behind a year in which so much has happened. When Stephen died on Trinity Sunday at one level our hearts were broken, yet at another they were thankful that he had been spared any further suffering from that dreadful disease MND. When the centenary of the Armistice fell on 11th November 2018 broken hearts were manifest in a different way as generations were remembered with thanksgiving for the supreme sacrifice they had made.

Isaac Watts hymn 'O God our help in ages past' has, in verse 5, a line that begins 'bears all our sons away' although many modern versions alter the words – sadly in my opinion because the imagery that Watts uses is important. 'Time like an ever rolling stream, bears all our sons away.'

The words 'time like an ever rolling stream' were used 17 years ago in the literature that preceded our anniversary commemorations of the Lynmouth Flood of 1952, when 34 people lost their lives.

If you look at a flowing stream and study it for just a few minutes you will rapidly become aware that the water will never, and cannot ever, return. Then a totally new outlook emerges.

This new year will bring plenty of opportunities for the Bride Valley. The appointment of a new Rector, in due course, will be one of those opportunities, but by no means the only one. Within the life of the Church, the communities, this beautiful part of West Dorset and the nation at large, there will be plenty of chances to proclaim afresh the good news of the Kingdom of God.

The late Sir Peter Imbert, who was my boss when he was Commissioner of the Metropolitan Police, used to say with great certainty that the only constant in life was change itself.

So, with time being like an ever rolling stream, we acknowledge that all things change. However, Christian **HOPE** underpins everything we aspire to. **HOPE** will energise and inform each one of us here in the Bride Valley during 2019 and way beyond.

My prayer is that each of us will believe and, indeed, echo the words of another great hymn, 'All my **HOPE** on God is Founded'.

So pray hopefully as we enter this New Year together. May it bring you all that you **HOPE** for.



Night Sky January 2019

Bill Turnill, who has very recently moved to Burton Bradstock from Surrey, has previously contributed astronomical notes to his local parish magazine and has offered to do the same for his new home area. Let us know what you think.

The first major meteor shower of 2019, the Quadrantids, peaks on the night of January 3 and early morning hours of January 4. The first Full Moon of the year is colloquially known as Wolf Moon in many northern cultures. January 2019's Wolf Moon is also a Super Moon, because the Full Moon takes place when the Moon is at its perigee, i.e. its closest to the Earth, so it will look a little larger than usual. It may appear even larger at moonrise

and moonset, but that is an illusion.

For early risers, there is another chance to see a total eclipse of the moon, beginning at 0236 on 21 January, with the lunar disc completely immersed in the darker umbral shadow beginning at 0441. Totality finishes at 0543, and by 0748 the eclipse will be over. Let us hope that the cloud out of the July total eclipse that we had in Surrey does not recur.

As for the planets, Venus and Jupiter are close together in the pre-dawn Sky , with Saturn close behind.

Hayabusa2 is an asteroid sample-return mission operated by the Japanese space agency, JAXA. It follows on from Hayabusa and addresses weak points identified in that mission. Hayabusa2 was launched on 3 December 2014 and rendezvoused with near-Earth asteroid 162173 Ryugu on 27 June 2018.

When Hayabusa2 snapped its first detailed images of Ryugu in June, scientists were "shocked" to find that it's basically a cluster of rubble rather than a smooth, dusty space rock like the asteroid Itokawa (which the original Hayabusa mission visited in 2005) and Eros. Scientists working on the Hayabusa2 were not prepared for the lack of safe landing sites on Ryugu, because they based their expectations of asteroid Ryugu on past experience they had with Itokawa where there was some smooth terrain on the surface, and they thought that's the way it should be. There might be some rocky part but there should be some smoother area.

Ryugu's inhospitable terrain proved to be a problem when the MASCOT lander came in for a bumpy arrival on October 2nd. On its way down, the hopping rover crashed into a rock and wound up upside-down with its instruments pointing out into space rather than down at the asteroid's surface. Thankfully, the rock was "not too hard" and mission controllers were able to flip the rover over and carry out all of the investigations as planned.

To find potential sampling sites for Hayabusa2, scientists created topographic models of Ryugu's surface using images from the MINERVA and MASCOT landers and looked for the smoothest areas on the asteroid's surface. One scientist commented that it's pretty much boulders everywhere, and there are not many areas that are smooth.

The Hayabusa2 team started out by selecting a square-shaped landing area measuring about 590 feet wide, and they have recently narrowed it to a circle about 66 feet in diameter.

Now, the next step is to work on improving the spacecraft's navigational accuracy. Hayabusa2's target markers are small, white balls about 4 inches in diameter. They're covered in a reflective film to make them visible to the Hayabusa2 spacecraft, which will use them to navigate during its descent for the sample-return phase of the mission.

I hope to be able to report on this aspect of the mission in a later article.



The music included Handel, Bach and Greig with also a combination of newer and traditional pieces. The hornpipe made for a rousing finale.





Hall Caretaker Vacancy

Do you want to get involved in Village life and earn some money at the same time?

The Village Hall is at the heart of a wide ranging set of activities from many Village based groups and is looking for a caretaker to provide a small range of services.

The main responsibilities are to ensure equipment needed by users such as tables and chairs are available inside the Hall, regular weekly safety checks of fire alarms, safety lights and defibrillator, putting bins out to schedule, leasing with contractors on larger repair jobs and carrying out minor repairs as they arise (light bulbs, batteries etc). The role does not involve interior cleaning, which is handled separately. Currently the role qualifies for a monthly payment of £200.

It is estimated at being on average about 4 hours a week, in a number of short visits, so would suit someone local to the Hall. The only physical requirement is the ability to move tables and chairs from storage sheds to Hall and back. There are wheeled trolleys to assist.

Those who have filled the role before say it gets them really involved with a lot of Village activities. It is currently being handled on a rota basis by committee members, who agree that 4 hours a week on average is correct. BB recreation group would like to say a really big thank you to everyone who has already donated to the Play Area Project but we still need help to reach our **£90,000 target**.

The playground was created 12 years ago thanks to generous contributions from local residents and businesses. The Parish Council has paid for maintenance and inspection since.
