First Reading

Isaiah 43: 1 - 7

But now thus says the LORD, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine. When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk

through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. For I am the LORD your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior. I give Egypt as your ransom, Ethiopia and Seba in exchange for you. Because you are precious in my sight, and honoured, and I love you, I give people in return for you, nations in exchange for your life. Do not fear, for I am with you; I will bring your offspring from the east, and from the west I will gather you; I will say to the north, "Give them up," and to the south, "Do not withhold; bring my sons from far away and my daughters from the end of the earth—everyone who is called by my name, whom I created for my glory, whom I formed and made."

Gospel Reading

Luke 3: 15 - 17; 21 - 22

As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

Now when all the people were baptized, and when Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, the heaven was opened, and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

Reflection

'Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine.'

Two exciting things have happened to me this week – the first, and most important, was on Monday when I met my first grandchild for the very first time! What a privilege to hold a week-old baby – it is a sacred moment. And his parents and I were saying how awesome it is to name another human – to give them the name that they will be known by through their life. We join with God in God's work when we give names to babies in this way.

Then, less importantly but still exciting for me, on Thursday, the 1921 Census was opened to the public for the very first time. It is now possible to search for family members alive a hundred years ago. I found my dad, a boy of 8 living with his mum and dad and four siblings in Milton, near Sittingbourne in Kent. In addition to the thrill, it also struck me really for the first time, how fortunate he was to have both parents living, for this was the first census after the Great War in which his father had been a stoker on steam ships in the navy and after the Spanish flu had brought death and devastation to so many families around the world. If you are familiar with the questions asked in previous censuses, you will see that there are new ones for 1921. One of the things this census was designed to highlight was how many single parent families there were, and how many 'blended' families – asking of every child on the census whether both of their parents were alive, even if they weren't living with both. This census, like no other before it, would have provided these detailed family statistics to the government for the challenging years ahead. 'Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine.'

These words, from our first reading, would have offered hope and reassurance originally to those Israelites who were languishing in exile in Babylon in the 6th century BC. They had seen their capital, Jerusalem, taken by king Nebuchadnezzar; their own king was now in prison in Babylon and the temple where God's presence was understood to be, had been demolished. These were tough times for Israelites – they weren't just experiencing physical trauma, they were questioning the very existence of their God and their own identity as God's people. Is our God still 'there'? Has God been defeated as we have? Have the gods of the Babylonians made our God impotent and helpless? If yes, then who are we? If yes, then what is the point of our existence?

It was through these tough times that new understandings of God and Jewish identity were forged. And the hope and vision of the future which this part of the book of Isaiah offered helped a great deal with

that. You can find God wherever you are – God is not confined to a building; you can live for God wherever you are – even in places you would rather not be and working for people you haven't chosen.

And what of us? We have stepped over the threshold into a new year – 2022: what will it bring? We know only too well one thing that has come with us into this new year. Thank goodness that when we went into lockdown for the first time in March 2020, we had no idea that we would still be battling the Covid virus two winters later. We haven't gone through a war, like our ancestors a hundred years ago, and thankfully we have vaccines to protect us against Covid – (all they had against the Spanish flu were the mitigations familiar to us, such as closing schools, churches and theatres, encouraging people to wear masks and isolate as best as they could during the two years it was potent). However, we too face challenging times ahead.

Those in exile in Babylon did eventually have the opportunity to return to Israel, when Cyrus king of Persia defeated the Babylonians. Some of them did indeed go back to their beloved land and home but they returned to a place of change and struggle. There is a moving account in Ezra of how some of the old people who remembered the Temple as it had been before they left, wept to see it in its current sorry state. We may not have had to leave home, but the world in which we live has changed around us. 'Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine.'

One of the clearest indicators that God has called us and not forgotten us is told in our Gospel reading — Jesus is baptised in the river Jordan at the start of his ministry on earth. The Jordan was a well used river by those living on its banks in those days — everything would have gone into it. Jesus was baptised, not in clean water in a font, but in the water of human life — all the flotsam and jetsam of everyday living. He was baptised into the struggles and challenges of life on earth and we are told that this was when the Holy Spirit came upon him, as he stood alongside men and women, with them, not lording it over them. And so let us be reassured as we seek to help bring in God's kingdom on earth in the coming year.
