Old Testament Reading

Deuteronomy 26.1-11

First Fruits and Tithes

When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, 'Today I declare to the Lord your God that I have come into the land that the Lord swore to our ancestors to give us.' When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the Lord your God, you shall make this response before the Lord your God: 'A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labour on us, we cried to the Lord, the God of our ancestors; the Lord heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. The Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O Lord, have given me.' You shall set it down before the Lord your God and bow down before the Lord your God. Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the Lord your God has given to you and to your house.

Epistle

Romans 10. 8b-13

'The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart'

(that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. The scripture says, 'No one who believes in him will be put to shame.' For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. For, 'Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

Luke 4:1-13

Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread." Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'One does not live by bread alone.'" Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And the devil said to him, "To you I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours." Jesus answered him, "It is written, 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him.'" Then the devil took him to Jerusalem, and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, for it is written, 'He will command his angels concerning you, to protect you,' and 'On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone." Jesus answered him, "It is said, 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.'" When the devil had finished every test, he departed from him until an opportune time.

Reflection

Lent is a time to examine our hearts and say no to temptation. Coming where it does in Luke's version of events we hear God's words of affirmation to Jesus at his baptism, then Luke's own genealogy, which establishes the proper place for Jesus in our memory of God's dealings with the world throughout. I think there is a pivotal moment in Luke's version of the story of Jesus in the wilderness where we are looking forward as well as looking back over the past.

Memories are key in all our readings today, we are urged to remember the faithfulness of God. In Deuteronomy we have a ritual for remembering what God did for his people, bringing them out of slavery in Egypt. At Harvest time we see them now in a settled domestic state, having arrived in the luxury of the time of God's fulfilled promises to them. Their thanksgiving action is small, easy even, but its significance lies in the act of recitation and memory. Then there is a party and the party is absolutely for everyone, not just for those to whom the promise was made.

These passages are all about remembering, accepting and re-enacting who you are. Memory on its own can be debilitating. It can make you think of what you once were, or what you might have become had your circumstances been different. Even accepting what your history has made you can be a passive thing, undermining your individuality and choices. But all of these passages are about a dynamic acceptance of what the meaning of that self-knowledge might offer you now. And that's not just for you who do the remembering, but also to encourage those to whom you are willing to share with about God's blessing and faithfulness over your life. Your experience of God may be the thing that helps others in their faith journey. Go ahead, talk about it.

Prayers

And so let us pray to the Lord for courage to give ourselves to God this Lent and to let go of what is unhelpful and hurtful.

Give your Church the courage to give up her preoccupation with herself and to give more time to your loving mission in the world.

Give your world the courage to give up war, bitterness and hatred, and to seek peace.

Give us the courage to give up our selfishness as we live for others, and to give time, care and comfort to the sick and those in need.

Lord, meet us in the silence, Give us strength and hear our prayer.

Give us the courage to give up our fear of death and to rejoice with those who have died in faith.

(Time for silent prayer)

Lord, meet us in the silence, give us strength and hear our prayer, here and in eternity. Amen.
