Other partners in the project include Modbury Farm and Balsons Butchers(England's oldest family butcher). We will be supporting local businesses whenever possible.

Becoming a Burton Pig Share Holder

As a Shareholder you will be asked to contribute a minimum of £100 by the 1st of March which will be held in an account at Burton Bradstock Post Office.

It is our aim that if all the pigs remain healthy and achieve the growth rate that we estimate you will receive approximately 10 KG of produce (sausages, chops, and other cuts that you specifically request) per £100 share. These items will be butchered and packed for your convenience.

Involvement as a shareholder is about far more than having Pork Chops in September: You will be given details of our web site so that you can be kept updated. You can visit the pigs in their fantastic location and have a direct involvement with the production of your own top quality food. Enjoy the experience of knowing that the food on your plate has been provided from animals that have had a happy life.

Value for Money

Our research has revealed that Organic Pork, which is unusual in Dorset, normally sells for between £10 and £12 per kilo.
